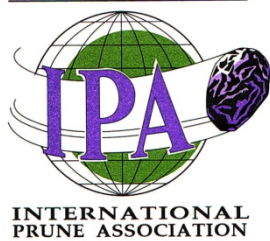

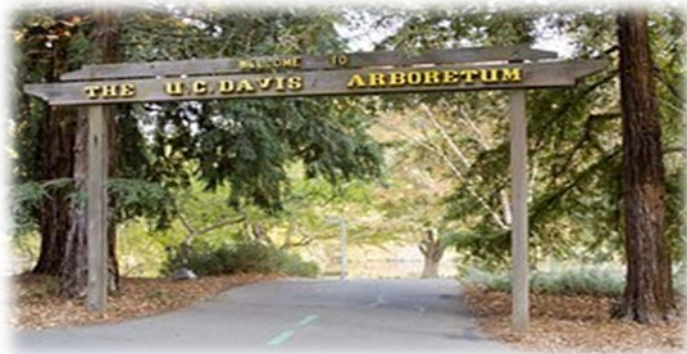

DELEGATE ACTIVITIES

Monday, May 21	IPA Executive Committee and General Assembly meetings at the headquarters hotel, The Hallmark Inn in Davis
Tuesday, May 22	Scientific reports on Plum Pox Virus, new prune varieties and current prune research will be given at the Academic and Recreation Center (ARC) on the UC Davis campus. A tour of the Sunsweet prune dehydrator, Sunsweet prune processing plant and the Wolfskill Experimental Prune Orchard will follow. Dinner will be served at the Sudwerk Restaurant and Brewery in Davis.
Wednesday, May 23	Congress at ARC will include the Secretary General's report, a statistical prune situation update, country reports from the U.S., France, Chile, Argentina, Italy, Australia and South Africa. These will be followed by a South India marketing campaign report, prune nutrition research overview, a report on prune osteoporosis research and a presentation on marketing opportunities for prunes. The day will conclude with a visit to the Davis Farmers' Market, voted America's Favorite Farmers' Market, featuring an international food faire, live entertainment and wine and beer garden. Dinner will be on your own.
Thursday, May 24	A field trip to the Yuba City area will feature prune orchard visits, a tour of prune processing plants and a barbecue lunch. The day will end with a tour of the Heidrick Agricultural History Museum with its impressive collection of farm equipment and trucks in Woodland followed by dinner.
Friday, May 25	A tour of the Robert Mondavi Institute for Wine and Food Science on the UC Davis campus will start the day. This will be followed by a tour of the Center for Land-Based Learning near Winters, CA that is dedicated to training the next generation of farmers and teaching California's youth about the importance of agriculture and watershed conservation. Lunch will be served at the Center. Following a move to the Holiday Inn Express and the adjacent Hampton Suites Hotels in Sacramento, the Conference Farewell Dinner will be held at the exclusive El Macero Country Club near Davis.
